COMPOUND "HEADS"

The right-most part of a compound is the head.



The head tells you the category of the compound:

A steamboat is a type of boat.

BUT WAIT!

Not all compounds work like that!

Some are:

"agentive and instrumental exocentric verb-noun compounds"

EXCEPTIONS LIKE CUTTHROAT

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cut + throat = verb + noun
row + boat = verb + noun
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A rowboat is a **boat**. A cutthroat is a **person**.




